NMMU Nursing Science Re-launch

It's been an exciting time for Nursing Science at Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University with the re-launch of the department on 2 May 2012. The arrival of a variety of high fidelity manikins together with other technical facilities has seen the department moving into a new era of teaching and learning.

The newly purchased high fidelity manikins can simulate a range of medical emergencies including heart attacks and strokes, and also the birthing process. The department has acquired a birthing mother, a newby (new born baby), a young child, an adult male and adult female.

In addition to the simulation technology, the department has also introduced 3D video cameras and television screens. Students working with the manikins and enacting a particular scenario can be filmed and reviewed and accessed through 3D screens in the classrooms.

The equipment was demonstrated to the public for the first time at the department's re-launch on the evening of 2 May 2012. A number of dignitaries attended together with members of the nursing fraternity and the department's practice partners.

Attendees at the re-launch included NMMU's Vice-Chancellor Prof Derrick Swartz, leading Department of Health and Department of Education officials and CEO of FUNDISA, Prof Leana Uys.

NMMU's vision of providing "cutting-edge knowledge for a sustainable future" is happening in the Department of Nursing Science which is using the latest technology to train nurse educators and clinical practitioners for the future. The Department is confident that its nurses will be suitably equipped to adapt to the changing face of nursing.





Health Awareness Day

The Lilitha College of Nursing, PE Campus has community outreach projects where services are rendered to community members. Following the Health Awareness Day at different Shopping Centers in the Metropole during the 2011 International Nurses' Day festivities, the Management of Walker Drive Shopping Centre contacted the College to request a similar service for this year.

Twelve (12) staff members from the Campus joined forces to plan and execute this event. The 2nd year Bridging Course and the 3rd year Diploma students currently allocated in CNS, was invited to participate. Posters and literature e.g. pamphlets, on different health related topics were put on display and distributed.

Statistics of the service rendered between 09:00-13:00 include 146 visitors. This includes 44 male and 102 female blood pressure readings of which 24 males and 25 females had elevated readings. Blood glucose readings were done for 44 males and 101 females of which 10 males and 9 females had elevated readings. Health education was given to all clients. Persons with elevated readings were given specific health education and referred to the clinic, hospital or their medical practitioner.

Free State Northern Cape Chapter

Simulated patient

The School of Nursing, University of Free State, held it's first Simulated Patient (SP) exercise on 29 March 2012. Seven rooms have been equipped with audio-visual recording devices and linked to a central console so that the lecturers can observe and listen in on any of the rooms.

The simulated patient

A psychiatric nursing student sits in a room with an actor playing the role of a patient with a mood disorder. The student is doing an assessment of the patient. Apart from the audiovisual recording devices the only equipment needed is a table and two chairs and an assessment guideline adapted from one already in their practica workbook.

That was nice and easy. The students are getting some good experience and can explore their performance and learn from their mistakes.

Wait a minute....did I say easy!?

On the surface it looks a simple enough task. Just get some drama students to act depressed – we all have felt depressed at some time or another and send the students in to do the assessment. What's the fuss?

Using a Simulated Patient

A Simulated Patient (SP) is a person who has been briefed to play a specific patient. Successful simulation depends on careful planning and adherence to certain principles.

A SP exercise must be as realistic as possible so the briefing if the "patient" is crucial. For example, concentration is the ability to focus on a topic for a period of time. We all have experienced times when we just can't concentrate for one reason or another. It is easy to just tell the SP that she is struggling with concentration but the assessment of concentration entails much more. There are at least four different tests that can be done to assess concentration and the SP's must be orientated how to answer in order to

demonstrate a lack of concentration for each eventuality.

Simulation process

The process of simulation is as follows: The SP's arrive and are put into a quiet room where they are briefed. The students arrive a little later and are also briefed as to their task and then they go to the rooms where the SP's are waiting for them and the exercise begins. After a set time the students are told to stop and exit the rooms. Now the SP gets time to reflect on the experience and when the student again enters the room the student is given feedback on how the patient experienced the exercise. This is not feedback on how well the task was performed but from the point of view as a patient.

Now the students are gathered into a room where they are debriefed in a group. Here they are guided to assess themselves on who well they did the task and where they made mistakes.

Outcome

So how did the students experience the simulation? As this was the first time they experienced this type of simulation some of them thought the patients were real. Obviously they were nervous and the drama students played their roles to perfection rendering a very realistic situation.

NEA Nurse Educator CPD

The Nursing Education Association (NEA) Board agreed at its February 2012 meeting to initiate a NEA Nurse Educator CPD programme. Nurse educators can include these certificates to their portfolios as proof of having attended continuous professional development activities to ensure updating of their competence.

How the system will work

The NEA Nurse Educator CPD programme will be based on the allocation of points for attendance of NEA activities and delegates will receive a certificate for each activity attended as a delegate or as a facilitator/presenter at one of these events.

The aim is for nurse educators to achieve 30 points per annum through the attendance of continuous professional development events for nurse educators. A certificate will be issued for the attendance of these events and a register will be kept of the certificates issued for each event.

Allocation of points

The NEA Nurse Educator CPD allocates points for every activity that is attended and the purpose is that you collect 30 points per annum.

The NEA Nurse Educator CPD points are awarded for activities as follows:

Each Chapter workshop attended 5 points

Conference attendance 5 points for 1 day

10 points for full attendance

Presenter, facilitator

at workshops or conference 10 points

Certificates

If you have attended one of the NEA workshops or the conference, you will receive a certificate similar to the one in the picture. Note that every



certificate will have the serial number that will be going into a register that will be archived for future reference.

Certificates will be allocated to persons who attended the full workshop, including non-members who paid their R200 for attendance of the workshop.



Let's Talk! NEA debate & discussion corner

In the previous edition of the newsletter some of the rules for etiquette when attending conferences, seminars or workshops were highlighted. Some of the comments received and some more tips were provided in response. Let's talk about it!

In the previous *Let's Talk* discussion the question was raised whether there is such a thing as conference/workshop etiquette. Based on the response, it appears that there is such a form of etiquette although not formally written down in any of the publications we work with.

Etiquette principles supported

Firstly the comments received, includes a wholehearted support for the principles highlighted and in particular support was voiced for the following principles:

- ◆ It is not acceptable to do a "no show" if you have booked for an event.
- ♦ It is unacceptable to book for a 'free' event and then just not pitch up. There is no such thing as a free event as there are refreshments, speakers, materials available at the event that has been paid for by someone.
- Never, ever pitch up at an event if you have not booked to attend the event.
- ◆ Be considerate to other delegates do not:
 - Forget to put your mobile on silent/meeting during the event AND
 - ♦ then answer it when the conference is in session.
 - ♦ Come in late when the conference has already started.
 - Leave when a speaker is still on the podium delivering his/her presentation.
 - ♦ Continuously talk when a presenter is speaking

What else is applicable?

Some of the other tips an guidelines provided, also makes for interesting reading. If you have booked to attend any conference or workshop or similar event, keep the following in mind:

Plan well before you go:

- Create a plan for organising the contacts you want to make at the conference.
- ◆ Do not sign up for more than one session at a time or change sessions when you are at the conference, as conference organisers plan according to the numbers booked.
- ◆ Check the conference information beforehand so that you plan to take suitable clothing with you to dress according to the required dress code for formal or outdoor events.

Networking is one of the most important activities at any event that educators attend to extend our networks:

- ◆ Take enough business cards with you.
- Wear your name badge at all times so that other delegates can see who you are.
- ◆ Remember to make notes about the people you meet and to follow up with an e-mail after the conference to maintain





contact.

During the conference there is quite a few additional things to give attention to:

- ♦ Try to get there early so that you can register and walk around to familiarise yourself with the layout of the venue.
- ◆ Stay alert throughout the conference. Conferences are generally busy and exhausting and generally we plan to have fun while attending. But it is also expensive to attend and we are also there to learn and get updated. To prevent falling asleep, eat lightly throughout the conference, limit alcohol consumption and drink more water than usual. Take short walks when possible. Wear loose and comfortable clothes and maintain good posture do not slouch in the chair
- ◆ Use the main language of the presentation for asking questions.
- ◆ Take only one set of handouts for yourself unless the presenter invites you to do otherwise. While it is a nice gesture to take handouts for colleagues who could not attend, paid registered delegates have priority in receiving handouts.
- ◆ Be brief when there is opportunity to ask questions, do not give your own speech and prevent others from asking their questions.
- When taking time to meet with presenters or other important guests at the conference, do not hog them or ramble on while other people are waiting behind you to also get a turn to speak to them.
- ♦ When attending functions, do not overindulge in food and alcohol just because it is free – or load your plate so full of food that the last guests in the row gets nothing.
- ♦ If there are exhibitors, do not continue to take handouts at the booths - leave some for other people too.

If all of us try to adhere to at least some of these principles, we could enhance the conference experience significantly.
